One of Wittgenstein's primary targets in the Philosophical Investigations have given rise to an impression that he believed that there is nothing determinate about the meaning of the concept 'game'. This is true in one sense, in that any attempt to give a rigid definition of a 'game' in terms of necessary and sufficient is bound to fail.

### Wittgenstein on the definition of a 'game' - Ask a Philosopher

Meaning is a complicated phenomenon that is woven into the fabric of our lives. A good first approximation of Wittgenstein's point is that meaning is a social event; meaning happens between language users. As a consequence, it makes no sense to talk about a private language, with words that mean something in the absence of other users of the language.

Wittgenstein's logic is a selected definition of meaning, one that is best explained by comparing language use to playing a game: if the game is played according to the rules, the moves in the game have meaning; similarly, if language is used according to its rules of "grammar", then the language has meaning.

### Wittgenstein's Logic of Language, Chapters 1-6

The view expressed in the Tractatus Logico-Philosophicus of Wittgenstein, that a sentence must share a pictorial form with whatever state of affairs it reports. Wittgenstein was impressed by the way a model, for instance of a traffic accident, could be used to illustrate the actual events, and the picture theory takes the relationship of model to situation as the fundamental semantic relationship.
