Hence a destructive, stable and constructive sense of self at the same is realized in a high range of re-established self-definition. The language, many a times goes out of the conventional frame and reaches dreamy pungent and creative deconstruction of a neo-lingual area of expression. Sexuality and so-called pungent and anti-state or anti-religious words turn most meaningful to reveal the internal psyche.

Liquid Love

On the Frailty of Human Bonds
